San Patricio Battalion

One of the most tragic occurrences in Irish-American history was the ordeal of the "San Patricio Battalion" (In English, Saint Patrick's Battalion) during the Mexican-American War. In the 1840's many newly arrived Irish immigrants enlisted in the American Army, and soon became involved in the growing struggle between Mexico and the United States. These tensions began when the United States annexed the independent Republic of Texas in 1845. The annexation resulted in a large area of disputed territory between the two nations; Mexico claimed the Nueces River to be the boundary while the United States claimed it to be the Rio Grande which was 150 miles to the south of the Nueces. No compromise was reached, and American President James K. Polk sent an army under General Zachary Taylor into the disputed territory. Fighting soon broke out and war was declared, igniting the Mexican-American War.

The Irish immigrants in Taylor's army faced a difficult position. They were serving in an army which was largely Protestant, and being sent to fight a Catholic nation. To add to this, Irish Catholics faced a great deal of discrimination in the American Army. They were often forced to attended Protestant services, punished more severely than their fellow Protestants, and rarely became officers. These men also had little attachment to their new nation, as they had only recently arrived. Taking advantage of this, the Mexican army sent leaflets into the American ranks, encouraging Catholics to desert to their Catholic brethren. These factors did result in desertion, the most notable being by native Irishman John Riley, who was among fifty deserters in April of 1846, shortly before war was declared. Riley received a commission as a Captain in the Mexican army where he was better treated and paid.

The desertions increased, numbering between 200 and 800, and eventually Mexican general, Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, divided the San Patricio Battalion into two companies. The troops initially served as artillery soldiers, only to be later switched to (continued page 2)

infantry where the two companies were commanded by John Riley and Captain Santiago O'Leary. The flag of the battalion was green with a harp and a shamrock. While there were more Irishmen than any other nationality in the battalion, it consisted of other nationalities as well. Irishmen made up approximately 40 percent of the battalion; among the remaining 60 percent were men from places such as Germany, Italy, France, Canada and even Poland.

The battalion served bravely during the war, most notably at the Battle of Buena Vista in February of 1847, in which the San Patricio battalion tore apart several American charges. Prior to Buena Vista the battalion also served at the Battles of Monterrey and Matamoros. Later on they served at the Battle of Cerro Gordo and ultimately met their downfall at the Battle of Churubusco in August of 1847. By this point in the war a major American Army, under the command of Winfield Scott, was advancing on Mexico City. Santa Anna, attempting to block Scott's advance on the city, established a defensive line which included a convent. The San Patricio Battalion was stationed in the convent when the battle began. Although the Mexican Army resisted stubbornly, the tide turned in favor of the Americans. Mexican soldiers inside the convent attempted several times to raise a white flag and surrender, but members of the San Patricio Battalion, knowing they were likely to be hanged as deserters if captured, tore down the flag each time. Eventually, the bloodshed ended and the San Patricio Battalion was captured.

The captured men were put on trial as deserters, and punishment was harsh. Fifty men were to be executed when Scott intervened and spared twenty men their lives, thus reducing to 30 the number to be executed. John Riley was spared death as he deserted before war was declared and instead was given 50 lashes and branded with the letter "D" on his cheeks, a scar that stayed with him for life. The condemned men were treated in exceedingly cruel fashion; they were forced to stand on the gallows and watch from a distance an American attack on the Chapultepec Castle, the last major defense outside of Mexico City, and they were to be hanged the moment the American flag flew over the castle. For three hours they stood in the sun and when the American flag was raised over the castle, the nooses were knotted and the men hanged.

This tragic event sheds light on the struggle for Irish immigrants to peacefully coexist with their fellow Americans. The story of these men is one that is not well enough known, and is one that should be remembered when reflecting on Irish-American history.
