James Napper Tandy was born in 1740 in Dublin and grew up to be a small metal tradesman in Dublin. Many know the famous name or even associate the name Napper Tandy with the string of pubs named after him but few know the true story of the ineffectual yet true Irish revolutionary.

James Napper Tandy first gained attention by his verbal attacks on municipal corruption and his proposal to boycott English goods. His actions were brought about as a reprisal for the crippling restrictions placed on Irish commerce. Tandy became so incensed by this cruel economic policy that he joined the Irish volunteer army and in 1791 he aided Theodore Wolfe Tone in founding the Dublin branch of the United Irish Society.

Because of his attacks and associations with the various outlawed groups Tandy was charged with sedition in 1793. Tandy first fled to the United States and then to France, where he was given the title of general. Feeling that military action was necessary, Tandy rounded up a small force of men and on September 16, 1798 set sail in the brig Anacréon. one of the fastest ships in the French navy and eventually landed at Rutland Island, off the Donegal coast but he abandoned the venture the same day when he discovered that the French expedition of General Humbert to aid the Irish rebellion had failed.

Napper Tandy, without any hope of additional military help, fled to Hamburg, Germany where he was later arrested. The rulers of the German city were sympathetic to England who returned him to Ireland where he was sentenced on April 7, 1801 to die by execution. As luck would have it, a reprieve

was granted because of the stern demand of Napoleon Bonaparte to free "his General". Tandy was freed in 1803 and went to Bordeaux, France to live and to die that vear.

Napper Tandy may have failed to win freedom for his countrymen or to even win any great military battle, but he did win the hearts of his fellow countrymen. His name and his fame is forever perpetuated in the Irish ballad "The Wearing of the Green."

I met with Napper Tandy, And he took me by the hand. And he said, "How's poor old Ireland. And how does she stand?"

Napper Tandy would be proud of how his beloved Ireland stands tall today.

I look forward to seeing all at the April 19th meeting.


