

St. Oliver Plunkett: Patron Saint of Peace and Reconciliation In Ireland

On October 10, 1975, Oliver Plunkett was canonized a saint by Pope Paul VI. St. Oliver was born in Loughcrew, County Meath on November 1, 1629 and was educated by his cousin Patrick Plunkett the abbot of St. Mary's in Dublin. In 1647, St. Oliver went to

Rome to continue his studies and was ordained in 1654. Due to Cromwell's conquest of Ireland from 1649-1653, it was impossible for St. Oliver to return to Ireland so he taught Theology in Rome. Constantly pleading the cause for Ireland over the next decade and being a leading intellectual and academic, St. Oliver was appointed the Archbishop of Armagh, the primate of the Irish church in 1669 and returned to Ireland in 1670. He quickly went to work reorganizing the church and the priests in an attempt to repair what Cromwell had destroyed. As the Archbishop he had to constantly move undetected, suffering much from cold and hunger, in order to be a faithful shepherd to Irish Catholics. Seen as a threat to the English crown, St. Oliver was falsely arrested in 1679 on the grounds of treason and was brought to Dublin Castle and put on trial at Dundalk. The prosecutors for the Crown did not have a case and St. Oliver was found innocent. Nevertheless, the British did not want to release him and had him shipped to Newgate Prison in London. In June 1681, the first grand jury also found no evidence of



crime and did not indict him, but relentless in their persecution the crown officers put him on trial a second time. Using the false testimony of known criminals and an all Protestant jury, St. Oliver was found guilty and sentenced to death. On July 1, 1681, St. Oliver was hanged and then his body was drawn and quartered. St. Oliver became the last of 264 Catholic martyrs recognized by the church to have lost their lives to the persecutions in England. His body was exhumed and his head preserved by the Benedictine Order in Germany. This relic was returned to Ireland in 1921 and is now held at St. Peter's Church in Drogheda. St. Oliver in 1975 became the first Irish saint canonized in over 700 years. Pope John Paul II in 1992 also canonized 17 other Irish martyrs. The feast day for St. Oliver is July 11. Even though St. Oliver only had a short administrative period in Ireland, he did confirm 48,000 Catholics, rebuilt many churches and reformed the clergy who were leaderless for many years during Cromwell's vicious program of exterminating Catholicism in Ireland.
